FRIENDSHIP MONTHLY MEETING FOR WORSHIP WITH ATTENTION TO BUSINESS GATHERED ON THE 11TH OF FIFTH MONTH 2008

Meeting began with silent worship. Clerk David MacInnes read Query 5 from *Faith and Practice* out of the silence:

Do we regularly attend our meetings for business, and are they held in a spirit of love, understanding, and forbearance? Do we seek the right course of action in humble submission to the Authority of Truth and in the patient search for a sense of unity under Divine guidance?

Several Friends responded out of the silence. The following minute serves as a summary of what was said:

Friends suggested that this meeting has done generally very well in keeping a core group of members who regularly attend business meeting. It is also felt that there is a waiting upon that which is both within and without us and the way that we do strive to stay in that deeper place as we conduct our business. The question was raised of how we go about inviting and encouraging Friends to attend Meeting for business. The issue of forbearance and the work of committees was also addressed. We recognize that Friends' other commitments and constraints may limit their service to meeting and appreciate the contributions that Friends do make to the life of the meeting. While our committees could at times do better, generally, they work well together and within the larger meeting community.

Friends approved the minute. David MacInnes will revise the minute over the course of the next month. Kembra Howdeshell volunteered to do Query 6 next month

Meeting Clerk David MacInnes presented the **Treasurer's Report** on behalf of Ray Treadway who could not be present. The summary report is as follows:

General Fund:	\$ 935.00	\$2,449.72	\$ 6,194.50
All Funds:	\$1,954.00	\$3,612.61	\$ 17,731.56

Expenses of note during the month are: advertisement in Friends Journal – \$60.00 (split between Care and Counsel and Worship and Ministry), reli-

gious education – \$75.00, donation to Quaker House of Fayetteville for operating expenses – \$100.00, contribution to North Carolina Yearly Meeting Conservative – \$1,750.00, and repair of the lawn mower – \$96.92. The cost for heating the meetinghouse for the previous month was \$136.77. The Meeting received \$1,000 as partial repayment for an emergency assistance loan. Finally, the Pax World account lost almost \$4,000 in market value during the first three months of 2008.

After four months of the budget year, the Meeting has received contributions of nearly \$6,500 and expended over \$12,000 for the general fund. **Contributions to the general fund and additional special contributions to the emergency fund would be very much appreciated.** Checks can be made out to Friendship Friends Meeting and sent to POB 8652, Greensboro NC 27419.

One Friend suggested that Friends donate a portion or all of their economic stimulus checks to the Meeting. The Clerk also noted that Friends could make monthly contributions to the Meeting instead of year end contributions. The full treasurer's report is attached to these minutes. Friends accepted the report with gratitude.

Traveling Minutes

Darryl Waisner returned his travel minute endorsed by the FGC Ministry and Nurture Yearly Meeting Consultation Committee, thanking us for his participation in their retreat.

Deborah Shaw requested a travel minute for her work on the pastoral care team for the Young Adult Friends gathering, "Living as Friends, Listening Within," being held over Memorial Day weekend at Earlham School of Religion.

Membership

Care and Counsel requested that Meeting approve Sheri Grace's membership clearness committee. Friends approved Darlene Stanley (Convener), John Bowles and David Bailey to serve on this committee.

Nominating Committee

Lisa Waldman, Clerk of Nominating Committee, delivered a preliminary committee assignment report. She thanks friends for their responses to the nominating survey and noted that the nominating process has provided a valuable opportunity for outreach to meeting members who have been less active in the work of the meeting in recent years. Letter from Nan Bowles

Hello members of Friendship Meeting.

Tom and I made it to Oklahoma and back again! Our time there was filled with stories that unfolded for us in each moment as we interacted and connected with the Cherokee people and the land.

The northeast corner of the state is set in the Ozark Mountains — rolling hills and valleys with clear running water. Spring was just coming in — peach trees blooming and a faint hint of new green leaves.

I would like to share one story among many with you.

The Story of Tsali (Charlie)

Tom and I visited the home of our friend Albert Wooford in Pryor, Oklahoma. Albert is nearly 80 years old but seems to be a young 65! He is a creator of small miniatures for his children. Miniature tables, chairs, wagons, horses, dogs, people carved from wood. He also carves walking sticks. For one walking stick he wove the vines together and let them grow for seven years before he cut them and formed them into a cane. He creates beauty, brings out the beauty in the wood that is already there.

One of the favorite Cherokee foods is kanuchi, thick porridge made from ground hickory nuts cooked with rice or hominy. Albert gathers the hickory nuts, pounds them. The ground up nut meats form a ball stuck together with the nuts natural oil. These kanuchi balls he sells to folks to store in the freezer till taken out for making the hot porridge. He calls himself Kanuchi Central! He also gathers wild onions this time of year for sale to the folks in Hominy, Oklahoma and others places around Pryor. Wild onions and eggs, another favorite Cherokee food.

While we were visiting with Albert he had his grandson, Tsali, with him. Tsali is a small person with deep brown eyes, three years old. The entire two hours we were there, Little Tsali never fussed, never demanded Albert's attention. Instead he was quiet and observant of all that was taking place between his grandfather and Tom and me. As we gathered around the kitchen table with Albert, Tsali would come up to me and gently, softly place

his hand on me and look up into my eyes. Sometimes he would smile and sometimes he wouldn't. Then he would take his hand away again and run off. Pretty soon he would gently, softly place his hand on my arm and look up into my face. He did this several times. Sometimes he would hold out his arms like he wanted to be held. So I would pick him up and hold him on my lap. He felt happy and content quiet but very present among us.

I felt a connection and ease with Little Tsali. I sensed the wisdom of an Elder, both in the Cherokee sense and the Quaker sense. A wise Elder within his large Spirit though he is a very small person at this time. A wise Elder looking into my heart and soul. I felt Creator's Love speaking through Tsali's gentle touches, letting Tom and me know we were Loved and welcome in Albert's home.

We have been blessed.

Current Issue for Action

The **Peace and Social Concerns Committee** will often highlight issues of current importance that we would like to bring to the attention of the Meeting. Our hope is that Friends can use this information to educate themselves and take action where they feel led.

In 2000, international leaders set a goal of eradicating extreme global poverty by 2015. As the wealthiest country, the United States has a special responsibility to provide effective and generous development assistance to countries trying to rise out of poverty. However, the US devotes only 0.17% of its Gross National Income, the lowest percentage among the world's richest countries.

Therefore, the Friends Committee on National Legislation asks concerned Friends to write their representatives and urge them to double funding for core development assistance from \$1.2 billion to \$2.4 billion. These funds are used to support microcredit projects, assist farmers in growing better crops, help children go to school, and provide a range of other services to those most in need. This would help support global security by reducing the root causes of violent conflict -- poverty, hunger, lack of education, and other sources of human suffering.
